
The Three-Body Problem by Cixin Liu, Translated by Ken Liu

The Three-Body Problem is the first book in the Remembrance of Earth's Past trilogy. It is a 2008 novel by the Chinese hard science fiction author Liu Cixin. The first season of a three-part American television version of the trilogy debuted on Netflix in March of 2025. The Three-body Problem received the Chinese science fiction Galaxy Award. It was published in English in 2014. The translation was the first novel by an Asian writer to win a Hugo Award for Best Novel; it was also nominated for the Nebula award.

I enjoyed the Netflix series and decided to read the books as movies and television series seldom compare well to the book. Each book in the trilogy is more than 500 pages in length, as you can imagine much has been left out or even changed in the television series

The series centers upon Earth's first contact with an extraterrestrial civilization. During China's Cultural Revolution, astrophysicist Ye Wenjie witnesses her father beaten to death during a struggle session when he refuses to denounce the Theory of Relativity. Shortly thereafter, she's falsely charged with sedition for promoting the works of environmentalist Rachel Carson. Ye is initially sentenced to a labor camp, but is then recruited to "Red Coast", a secret military initiative attempting to search for and communicate with extraterrestrial life.

At Red Coast, Ye discovers a method to amplify radio frequency transmissions and she secretly broadcasts a message. She receives a reply from the planet Trisolaris. With the message "I am a pacifist of this world. I am warning you do not answer." Disillusioned by humanity's inability to live harmoniously with itself and nature, Ye invites the Trisolarans to Earth.





Trisolaris, it turns out, is a harsh world: it orbits three stars in an unpredictable pattern (the Three-Body Problem), destroying civilizations over and over again. Now, that the Trisolarians know where a stable, habitable planet is they begin planning the 400-year journey to Earth.

The stage is set for you reader, this introduction is just a small taste of a story that will take more than 400 years to reach its conclusion. This is not a "Star Wars" type of science fiction this is hard science and pseudo-science with many political and moral questions explored. Critics praise the trilogy for its ambitious scope, meticulous research, and the profound philosophical questions it raises about humanity's place in the universe and its worthiness of salvation.

The series is a fascinating exploration of Earth's "First Encounter" and how each side plans/ strategizes/fails. Even the note from the translator is interesting.

Your library owns all three books in this series. Check them out and take a break in the coolness of your home during the summer's afternoon heat that will soon be upon us, and be transported.
